Community-Based Reintegration Assistance in the Horn of Africa

Projects implemented under the EU-IOM Joint Initiative for Migrant Protection and Reintegration and the Individual Measure Project between March 2017 and April 2023





In IOM's Integrated Approach to Reintegration,¹ community-based reintegration assistance programme aims at strengthening community networks and improving the conditions for sustainable reintegration. Initiatives at this level are implemented using a participatory approach involving returnees and their communities of return to address wider needs and concerns, increasing support for reintegration among local actors.

Under the EU-IOM Joint Initiative for Migrant Protection and Reintegration² in the Horn of Africa, IOM and its partners implemented 60 community-based reintegration assistance initiatives.³ In several instances, the initiatives targeted areas with high incidence of irregular migration where several returning migrants concentrated, allowing to reduce tensions between returnees and local communities, or serve as extra capacity when a community has been stretched to accommodate returnees' needs.






Community Response⁴

- The estimated number of direct beneficiaries of Community-Based Reintegration projects is 77,973 (29,223 male, 48,750 female). A number of initiatives entailed the improvement of public infrastructure and services in communities with high incidence of irregular migration: in such cases, the number of direct beneficiaries was estimated based on population size residing in the catchment area of the facilities or infrastructure improved. These estimates were possible in Somalia and Sudan only, but not in Ethiopia due to lack of data.

Community Vocational Training in El Fasher

North Darfur

To address the low employment rate, the lack of livelihood options and the high incidence of irregular migration in the El Fasher area, two hundred local youths, including returnees and other community members, enrolled in a three-month vocational training programme. They could choose one of the following trades: car maintenance, welding, plumbing, general electricity, and soil stabilization block production and usage (The technology allows for zero consumption of firewood and structural timber in building construction. There is also a consistent reduction in water usage up to 60 percent less than the amount needed to produce fired bricks. It uses locally available resources). The training was followed by a 20-day internship. All the participants received toolkits to start offering services in their trade of choice.

Garbage Management and Community Hygiene Promotion in Nyala

South Darfur

Ten communities with high incidence of irregular migration in the Nyala area were targeted for a hygiene promotion community engagement campaign through radio, billboards, pamphlets and a mobile theatre. Community members, returnees and students, teachers including local businessman embarked on several clean-up and environmental conservation activities, in close collaboration with the local Hygiene and Sanitation Unit of the Ministry of Health. IOM and the Ministry provided the project with a truck. In addition to the above efforts, one community member also volunteered his truck to support other communities with the garbage collection. Despite the end of II contribution, the Ministry has continued to lead this project and is planning to replicate it in the Beliel locality.

Community Vocational Training Project in Nyala

South Darfur

To reduce youth unemployment and improve the supply of services to the community, 198 youths in Nyala received entrepreneurship training on in-demand trades such as mobile phone maintenance, vehicle maintenance, home appliance maintenance, handicraft and leather products, perfume making, sewing and food processing. Several participants went on to open their businesses after the training. Sixty women who graduated from the training started working together at the Nyala Youth Centre to produce goods and sell them. They also pass on their skill to other women in the community.

Rehabilitation of the Um Baddah Community Multi-Purpose Center

Khartoum

Residents of Um Baddah, a locality in the Khartoum state with high incidence of irregular migration and youth unemployment, are benefiting from the rehabilitation of the local Multi-Purpose Community Centre. The Centre is managed by a Community Development Committee and provides a safe place for social gatherings, meetings, community mobilisation and income generation activities (two of the centre's rooms are used by local youths for soap making and laundry services). The space also includes recreational facilities such as a watching club and a sport pitch for volleyball and basketball.

Rehabilitation of the El Naseem Youth Centre in Geneina

West Darfur

The rehabilitated El Nassem Youth Centre serves as a platform to strengthen ties between returning migrants and the rest of the community, as well as to support local youths and women in general. Managed by a committee comprising local youths, the Centre is also a free hub for social gatherings and community mobilisation activities.

Rehabilitation of the Um Shalaya Water Yard

Central Darfur

Water is scarce in Um Shalaya and its management is of utmost importance. This locality is placed along an important transhumance route and is also an important place of origin and return for Sudanese migrants. The rehabilitation of the local water yard aimed at improving access to water for non-migrants, returnees, IDPs and transhumant herders and reducing the risk of conflicts. The inclusion of returnees in the Project Committee was important to highlight the contribution of migrants to community development. A space for social interaction was also created under the same initiative.

Rehabilitation of Dreisaya School in Um Shalaya

Central Darfur

The rehabilitation of the Dreisaya Primary School was a priority for community leaders, returnees and authorities in Um Shalaya. Before the intervention, learners were studying while seated on the ground, under the sun or in a temporary shelter. The initiative aimed at creating a conducive learning environment where students and teachers are motivated.



Fruit Trees Cultivation and Agricultural Inputs in Um Shalaya

Central Darfur

The project targeted four villages in Um Shalaya, an area with high incidence of irregular migration. Traditional farming tools and technical training were given to 200 women, in collaboration with local women's agricultural associations. The project also rehabilitated a tree nursery and supported fruit tree plantation campaigns to enhance income generation and increase the area's greenery.



Community-Based Mental Health and Psychosocial Support Assistance

North, South, West Darfur, and Gadarif State

Host communities, returnees and their families in El Fasher (North Darfur), Nyala (South Darfur), Genina (West Darfur) and Gadarif (Gadarif) benefited from mental health and psychosocial support to accelerate recovery and reintegration. However, most of the residents in the target areas have been affected by the civil war, displacement, COVID-19 pandemic, competition over limited resources and lack of livelihood, sometimes resulting in an irregular migration journey that further strains individuals and their families. Under this initiative, the participants learned to recognise the returnees as a part of the society, strengthening their ties and helping them live in social co-existence. In addition, they learned to utilise existing community structures, acknowledge psychological distress, and manage them.
